

# Foster VC Kids Manager Message

October/November

Fostering is both a calling of joy and sorrow. We rejoice in giving comfort and care to children who are both sad and afraid and when we see them thrive in the midst of such comfort and support. We rejoice when we see families grow and change, resulting in parents receiving their children home again. We rejoice when the children we love become new member of our own families. Nevertheless, this labor of love is also one that comes with sorrows: sorrow when we feel rejected by the very children we are caring for; sorrow when children experience their own rejection and sorrow when reunification fails and sorrow when reunification is successful.

You have heard us say that our caregivers are valued partners. You are valued. Children and families cannot be successful without your support, your guidance, your championing. At the same time, you may not always feel like a valued partner. We would like to find new ways to listen to, hear and support you with concrete actions. As part of this effort, I have formed the new Foster Parent Advisory Round Table. The Roundtable is open to all caregivers and will meet on a monthly basis to discuss what is and is not working well, what improvements need to take place within our agency and caregiving community and how we can better support and equip caregivers to provide the best trauma informed care. #### **FAMILY, FRIENDS, AND CONNECTION**

This is the time of year where the hustle and bustle starts to pick up, and the planning and preparation for holidays begins. As we head into the holiday season, it is always important to start thinking about how you will support the children in your home in staying connected to their families and culture during this time of celebration and memory making. Holidays are a time for family, friends, and connection. Being away from our families and friends during this time can especially result in increased loneliness and longing for our families. The holidays are a great time to practice partnership with your child's birth family and relatives-you may ask questions about important holiday rituals, customs or gift ideas for the child, you may want to consider asking the social worker for permission to take a family member with you to start the holiday shopping, or perhaps a special recipe will be shared with you that you can try to master before the holidays!

It is also important to remember that holidays, and other big events, are often a time when more questions (and more feelings) begin to surface. Remember it is important to leave time to answer these big questions and to help children process their strong feelings about being away from their families during the holidays. This is a time to cue into any changes in your child's behavior, communication, and overall functioning. It is not uncommon that some regressive behavior takes place during times of strong emotions and changes to the routine. If you begin to notice significant changes, or any changes that worry you, please remember to speak to your child's social worker and discuss the possibility of having the child re-screened for mental health services. Also, it is very helpful to articulate to the child what the child may be feeling, but not fully understand, such as "You seem sad... I imagine being away from you mommy at Christmas is sad for you." You may also contact the child's social worker, or your Foster VC Kids RDS worker, and request a referral to the Support, Education, and Training (SET) program Kids and Families Together offers. This program can provide in-home training and education with a clinician who can help you fine-tune your plan to support the child during the exciting and emotional holiday season.

#### **NOVEMBER 21ST IS NATIONAL ADOPTION DAY!**

National Adoption Day is a collective national effort to raise awareness of the more than 100,000 children in foster care in the nation waiting to find permanent, loving families. Within Ventura County, we have approximately 100 children within long term foster care who need unconditional, permanent connections. Let us give thanks and celebrate the many families in Ventura County who provide a lifelong permanent and loving connection! This year to date, 113 children have been adopted into loving homes! # Agency Updates

#### **FOSTER HEALTH LINK**

Have you registered to use our new web and app based Foster Health Link portal to access health his-tory of children in your care? Foster Parent Antony B. has had 65 placements and said this is was one of the most important new resources for him as a caregiver. He said it is very easy to use and he uses it both on his phone and his tablet to find out medical information for the children in his care! Among a host of health supports, it allows you to immediately access your child's health records, immunization records, and locate your child's physician. All caregivers are requested to sign-up to have access to this information. We know life gets busy and that you have had every intention of signing up! But then when you found the time, the password was expired! Fear not! You can get a new password and join in all the information sharing! Just call the FHL support team at (844) 654-3251 and request a password reset. Please note that the area code is 844 and not 805. #### **EMERGENCY SHELTER FOSTER HOMES**

As part of our Continuum of Care Reform efforts, we have prioritized the need for children to be placed with families in home settings rather than emergency group home shelters when first removed from their parents. In order to do so, we are seeking to expand the number of Emergency Shelter Fos-ter Homes (ESFH) in Ventura County, particularly within the West County region. Emergency Shelter Care placements are short term foster placements limited to 30 days (to a maximum of 60 days with management approval). ESFH caregivers will agree to accept any placement request if they have an emergency bed available for the age range/gender requested. The goal is to ensure that children are placed in a family setting rather than group home while we locate a stable relative or longer term fos-ter placement. Emergency shelter foster caregivers are seasoned, high quality county or FFA homes who agree to be available 24/7 to receive an emergency placement for a 30 day time period. We will also identify additional support resources while we work together to stabilize the children during the painful and frightening time of removal. Emergency Care Foster Homes will receive a monthly retainer fee for each shelter bed identified, independent of whether a child is placed in care, with the under-standing that caregivers shall be prepared to take an emergency placement at any time of day and will accept all placement requests if they have an available ESFH bed (unless during an identified vacation or respite break). ESFH contractors will also agree to provide transportation to the child's home school if it is within a 10 mile radius, as well as visits to siblings. Monthly retainers range from \$325 to \$775/ month per ESFH bed. #### **OUT OF COUNTY PLACEMENTS**

We continue to receive word that some of our families are being contacted by neighboring counties to take placement of non-Ventura county children. We also know that some families, in the hopes of be-ing able to open their home sooner, also contact neighboring counties to request placement of that county's children in their home. Your license is a state license that allows you to care for any child in foster care in California. It is important that you remember, however, that taking placements of an out-of-county child will affect what kinds of resources and support you will be able access and limits local children's access to local caregivers and here in Ventura County. Many of our programs, such as the Children's Services Auxiliary and our Channel Islands Social Services Respite Program, are specifi-cally for Ventura County children and cases supervised by Ventura County CFS. Other considerations include how you will support visitation and maintaining family connections for an out-of-county child and what kinds of medical and mental health services will be available to an out-ofcounty child. If you have not received a placement request from our local placement coordinators, you can leave them a message on the vacancy line at 289-1900 to let them know you have an opening. You may want to also consider changing your capacity to enable you to meet a broader range of placement needs-we often find that caregivers who haven't had a placement have a narrow capacity that limits which children they are able to support in the home. If this is the case, talk with your licensing program analyst about a possible license modification.

#### **ROAD TO INDEPENDENCE**

If you are caring for a foster youth ages 14-18, this event is not to be missed! Casa Pacifica's Transitional Youth Services will be hosting its Road to Independence, a "mock city" event for transitional youth ages 14-18 years, on Saturday, October 24, 2015, from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., in the gymnasium located at 1722 S. Lewis Road, Camarillo, CA. With so many youth leaving systems of support to be on their own early in life, it is essential to provide a point of reference and a fundamental understanding of what to expect from life once they begin their journey out on their own. The Road to Independence accesses the professional skills and expertise of community members to directly teach young, disadvantaged foster youth practical lessons about what it takes to be successful in life. The event features eighteen booths where youth practice life skills – booths such as a courthouse, apartment rentals, grocery store, survival station, bank, credit counseling, educational options, employment, health care, social services, transitional housing, transportation, electric, gas, and telephone companies. Replicating real life experiences to familiarize them with detailed and specific personal management requirements ensure youth are better prepared to transition to adulthood. With that said, all youth still need a lifelong, unconditionally committed family. We continue to seek permanency for our older youth, so that they do not need to grow up alone and without support. Communication is Key!

Co-Parenting and Reunification

Melissa and Tony have established themselves as a support system for the birth parents of their foster child. In December of this past year, a child, who had never been exposed to structure or routine was placed in the home. The entire family, Melissa and Tony's children, worked through the stress of having a child with high needs in the home. The foster parents arranged for a meeting at the school and insisted that the biological parents of the child be a part of that meeting. This was just the beginning of Melissa and Tony's focus on incorporating the biological parents as much as possible into their care for the child. Melissa and Tony allowed the

parents to call the foster home to speak to the child and updated the biological parents on the child's behaviors at school. Melissa and Tony also began PCIT (Parent-Child Interaction Therapy) with the child and eventually TBS (Therapeutic Behavioral Services) as well. During this time, the foster parents worked with the biological parents to ensure that the tools they were learning in PCIT were being utilized with the biological parents during visits so that the child was provided with consistent care and the parents felt empowered that they were a part of the child's treatment process. As visits increased, Melissa and Tony allowed the biological parents to pick the child up directly from their home which allowed them to further work together with the parents and establish a routine and boundaries for the child as a united team. Recently, the child was placed with the parents for a 60 day visit. At the Team Decision Making meeting, due to the relationship they had established, the team was able to openly address concerns in a respectful manner. Furthermore, during the meeting the biological parents stated their respect and gratitude for Melissa and Tony and thanked them for loving their son while he was out of their care. One of the outcomes of the Team Decision Making meeting was that Melissa and Tony decided with the biological parents that they are going to continue to be a part of the child's life through scheduled play dates.

Melissa and Tony informed the agency that working as a team with the biological parents made the process of returning the child to the biological parent's home easier than with previous children they have had in their care, as they will remain in contact with this child and continue to be a support system for this child's family. — Katie B., Social Worker
