

The Integral Co-Parenting Relationship Manager's Message

Resource Families play an essential role in helping a child's birth parents stay emotionally connected to their child and in supporting family reunification. When parents and resource parents work together, we now know that kids go home more quickly and stay home. Children in foster care also get better care when the parent and resource parent exchange information and insights about the child and work together to make visits positive. Kids also feel less worried about their families and demonstrate lower anxiety and fear. Many kids are worried about loyalty—if they like the foster parent, does that mean they can't like their parent anymore? Children feel better and safer if they see the foster parent and parent getting along.

Reunification is also easier for the child if the relationship with the resource parent doesn't end, even if contact with the foster parent is just a card, a phone call, or occasional stopping by. The resource parent can become an ongoing support to the parent after reunification, someone who is an expert about their child and part of the larger safety network. When things are tough and a child is acting out, the parent can call and say, "What do I do?" The resource parent is able to say, "This worked for me." This kind of communication and support can help prevent the child from re-entering foster care and help children and their parents stabilize for the long term.

One way that Ventura County is seeking to enhance the co-parenting relationship is through hosting All About Me Ice Breaker meetings between caregivers and parents. Through the use of simple questions like "share with me your child's favorite foods, comfort items, etc.", caregivers and parents take the first step towards a partnership of mutual caring and support for their children. Q: How can parents and foster parents build connections?

I talk about a concept I call "the bridge"—you can agree together about where you need to be on that bridge and move forward in baby steps to cross it. You don't have to start with face-to-face meetings. There are a lot of ways to have contact: exchanging notes about the child, talking on the phone, or attending school meetings or doctor visits where the parent can provide useful information about the child. When you both naturally feel ready to move to the next level, you can begin meeting in neutral territory. Once you get past the awkwardness and everyone feels comfortable, the

foster parent can take the child to the parent's home for visits, or let the parent come to her home. These steps are case-by-case, moment-to moment decisions made in partnership with the social worker, parent and foster parent.

Q: How can the child welfare agency help in the co-parenting process?

An "All About Me Icebreaker" meeting soon after placement is a first step where the parent and foster parent meet and talk about what the foster parent needs to know to take good care of the child. The foster parent can ask about the child's favorite foods or activities. The foster parent may say, "Johnny keeps asking me why he's in foster care. How can we handle that?" Parents and foster parents can talk about how to have good visits. Would the parent like to bring the child a snack? Would the parent like to do the child's hair? Can they talk before the visit so that the parent can ask about the child's activities, like, "I heard you went to the zoo. Tell me about that." They can discuss how to end visits in a positive way. The more you can talk and agree up front, the smoother things will go.

The School Zone

Dear FYS,

I am a new foster parent and have placement of two school-aged siblings. I want to make sure they are receiving all of the services and resources available to them through the school district, as they are both behind in school. Do they need an IEP?

Eager to get started



Dear Eager,

Congratulations on your new family! There is a lot to consider when deciding what services students may need in school and the process to identify appropriate interventions isn't always clear.

First, you'll want to identify the Foster Youth Education Liaison in your district. You can click HERE for a list. Call or email and introduce yourself as the new foster parent to the two students. Ask him or her how the district and school handle requests for services when students are struggling. Typically, schools are able to offer services such as tutoring, school counseling, extra help, and other interventions within the general education environment. You'll also want to make contact with the school principal and counselor, identifying yourself as the care provider and conveying your concerns. You might want to ask for a "Student Study Team" meeting (or similarly-named meeting) for a school team to sit down together to discuss the concerns you and school staff may have about the child and brainstorm interventions.

If you, as the care provider, do not hold education rights for the children, you will be limited in what you are able to accomplish directly with the school. You'll want to make sure your social worker is assisting you with any information that needs to be communicated with the education rights holder (often the bio parents). Everyone should work together as a team to ensure a student's needs are met. Education is a great opportunity for co-parenting!

Finally, if interventions do not adequately address a student's needs over a period of time, a special education evaluation may be in order. For specific timelines and responsibilities regarding the special education referral process, see www.vcselpa.org.

Nurses Corner: A Medical Home for Foster Youth

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends a medical home for each child and youth in order to "to provide uninterrupted care.. to support and sustain optimal outcomes." Children in foster care are not an exception. Children in foster care have historically not received consistent medical, dental, or behavioral health care, yet they are often at the greatest risk to be suffering from a medical, dental, or behavioral health condition. A "medical home" is a partnership between the family and their health care provider. This partnership will be the entry point to a system of care giving access to a variety of needed services. The medical home is guided by the physician, to serve patients with comprehensive, coordinated, and continuous care. This medical home will also provide a consistent relationship with a medical provider and staff who know the child well.

Children in foster care are required to receive a medical and dental exam within 30 days from the day they enter foster care. Effort should be made to have this exam be at the place where the child has received care in the past. You can ask a social worker to try and find this out for you. If this is not possible, care should be started and every effort should be made to have the child continue to be seen where care was started once the child entered foster care. The reality children in foster care is that they may have to be moved from one home to another, though every effort is made by our agency to keep this from happening. Each time a child sees a new medical, dental, or behavioral health provider, it may result in a loss of continuity of care, duplication of medical services, loss of time in delivering needed treatment, or important follow up not done.

Children and Family Services has a team of Public Health Nurses to help foster families establish or continue services with a medical home. Please call us for any health related issue you may have. (805)654-3467, please ask to speak to a Public Health Nurse.



Research has shown that when partners are securely attached, they find it easier to be good parents. They also model healthy relationships for their children and tend to have children who are also securely attached. Securely attached children are happier, more socially competent, more resilient to stress, and more likely to form healthy relationships in the future.

The Critical Need Continues...

In the Month of December:

There were 791 children in care

271 children were in foster home placements (County & FFA)

317 children were in kinship/relative care placements

98 children were in guardian homes

9 finalized adoptions (122 Calendar year-to-date)

65 children remained in group homes/shelter care

31.3% of siblings are separated from each other

18.3% are placed with some, but not all siblings

We welcomed 9 new foster homes into the Foster VC Kids family!
