La relación de co-crianza integral: Mensaje de la directora

Las familias de apoyo desempeñan un papel esencial en ayudar a los padres biológicos del niño a mantenerse emocionalmente conectados con su hijo y en apoyar la reunificación familiar. Cuando padres y padres de apoyo trabajan juntos, ahora sabemos que los niños van a casa más rápido y se quedan en casa. Los niños en cuidado de crianza también obtienen mejor atención cuando el padre y el padre de apoyo intercambian información e ideas sobre el niño y trabajan juntos para hacer visitas positivas. Los niños también se sienten menos preocupados por sus familias y demuestran menor ansiedad y miedo. Muchos niños están preocupados por la lealtad, si les gusta el padre de crianza, ¿significa que ya no pueden gustar a sus padres? Los niños se sienten mejor y más seguros si ven que el padre de crianza y el padre se llevan bien.

La reunificación también es más fácil para el niño si la relación con el padre de apoyo no termina, incluso si el contacto con el padre de crianza es sólo una tarjeta, una llamada telefónica o una parada ocasional. El padre de apoyo puede convertirse en un apoyo continuo para los padres después de la reunificación, alguien que es un experto sobre su hijo y parte de la red de seguridad más grande. Cuando las cosas son difíciles y un niño está portándose mal, el padre puede llamar y decir, “¿Qué debo hacer?” El padre de apoyo es capaz de decir, “Esto funcionó para mí.” Este tipo de comunicación y apoyo puede ayudar a prevenir que el niño vuelva a entrar en el hogar de crianza y ayudar a los niños y a sus padres a estabilizarse a largo plazo.

Una de las formas en que el Condado de Ventura está tratando de mejorar la relación de co-crianza es a través de las reuniones de Rompehielos Todo Acerca de Mi (All About Me Ice Breaker) entre los cuidadores y los padres. Mediante el uso de preguntas sencillas como “compartir conmigo los alimentos favoritos de su hijo, artículos de confort, etc.”, los cuidadores y los padres dan el primer paso hacia una asociación de cuidado mutuo y apoyo para sus hijos.

Preguntas y Respuestas

P: ¿Cómo pueden los padres y padres de crianza construir conexiones?

Hablo de un concepto que yo llamo “el puente”: puedes estar de acuerdo sobre dónde debes estar en ese puente y avanzar en pasos de bebé para cruzarlo. Usted no tienen que comenzar con reuniones cara a cara. Hay muchas maneras de tener contacto: intercambiar notas sobre el niño, hablar por teléfono, asistir a reuniones escolares o visitas al médico donde el padre puede proporcionar información útil sobre el niño. Cuando ambos se sienten naturalmente listos para pasar al siguiente nivel, pueden comenzar a reunirse en territorio neutral. Una vez que haya superado la incomodidad y todos se sientan cómodos, el padre adoptivo puede llevar al niño a la casa de los padres para que lo visite o dejar que los padres lleguen a su casa. Estos pasos son caso por caso, las decisiones de momento a momento tomadas en asociación con el trabajador social, padre y parente de crianza.

P: ¿Cómo puede la agencia de bienestar infantil ayudar en el proceso de co-crianza?

Una reunión de “Rompehielos Todo Acerca de Mi” poco después de la colocación es un primer paso donde el parente y el parente de crianza se reúnen y hablan de lo que el parente de crianza debe saber para cuidar bien al niño. El parente de crianza puede preguntar sobre los alimentos favoritos del niño o actividades. El parente de crianza puede decir: “Johnny sigue preguntándose por qué está en cuidado de crianza temporal, ¿cómo podemos manejar eso?” Los padres y parentes de crianza temporal pueden hablar acerca de cómo tener buenas visitas. ¿Podrían hablar los padres antes de la visita para que los padres puedan preguntar acerca de las actividades del niño, como, “Escuché que fuiste al zoológico, cuéntame sobre eso”. Terminar las visitas de una manera positiva. Cuanto más se puede hablar y estar de acuerdo en la delantera, las cosas más suaves irán.

The School Zone

Dear FYS,

I am a new foster parent and have placement of two school-aged siblings. I want to make sure they are receiving all of the services and resources available to them through the school district, as they are both behind in school. Do they need an IEP?

— Eager to get started



Dear Eager,

Congratulations on your new family! There is a lot to consider when deciding what services students may need in school and the process to identify appropriate interventions isn't always clear.

First, you'll want to identify the Foster Youth Education Liaison in your district. You can click [HERE](#) for a list. Call or email and introduce yourself as the new foster parent to the two students. Ask him or her how the district and school handle requests for services when students are struggling. Typically, schools are able to offer services such as tutoring, school counseling, extra help, and other interventions within the general education environment. You'll also want to make contact with the school principal and counselor, identifying yourself as the care provider and conveying your concerns. You might want to ask for a "Student Study Team" meeting (or similarly-named meeting) for a school team to sit down together to discuss the concerns you and school staff may have about the child and brainstorm interventions.

If you, as the care provider, do not hold education rights for the children, you will be limited in what you are able to accomplish directly with the school. You'll want to make sure your social worker is assisting you with any information that needs to be communicated with the education rights holder (often the bio parents). Everyone should work together as a team to ensure a student's needs are met. Education is a great opportunity for co-parenting!

Finally, if interventions do not adequately address a student's needs over a period of time, a special education evaluation may be in order. For specific timelines and responsibilities regarding the special education referral process, see www.vcselpa.org.

Esquina de Enfermería: Un Hogar Médico para la Juventud de Crianza

La Academia Americana de Pediatría recomienda un hogar médico para cada niño y joven con el fin de “proporcionar cuidado ininterrumpido .. para apoyar y mantener resultados óptimos”. Los niños en cuidado de crianza temporal no son una excepción. Históricamente, los niños que reciben cuidado de crianza temporal no recibieron atención médica, dental o de salud mental consistente, pero a menudo corren el mayor riesgo de padecer una condición médica, dental o de salud mental. Un “hogar médico” es una asociación entre la familia y su proveedor de atención médica. Esta asociación será el punto de entrada a un sistema de atención que da acceso a una variedad de servicios necesarios. El hogar médico es guiado por el médico, para servir a los pacientes con atención integral, coordinada y continua. Este hogar médico también proporcionará una relación consistente con un proveedor médico y personal que conoce bien al niño.

Los niños en cuidado de crianza temporal están obligados a recibir un examen médico y dental dentro de los 30 días a partir del día en que entran en el hogar de crianza temporal. Se debe hacer un esfuerzo para que este examen se realice en el lugar donde el niño ha recibido atención en el pasado. Si no es posible, debe iniciarse el cuidado y se debe hacer todo lo posible para que el niño continúe viéndose donde se inició la atención una vez que el niño entró en el hogar de crianza temporal. La realidad de un niño en cuidado de crianza es que pueden tener que ser trasladados de un hogar a otro, aunque cada esfuerzo es hecho por nuestra agencia para evitar que esto suceda. Cada vez que un niño ve a un nuevo proveedor de salud mental, dental o de comportamiento, puede resultar en una pérdida de continuidad de la atención, duplicación de servicios médicos, pérdida de tiempo en la entrega del tratamiento necesario o seguimiento importante no realizado.

Servicios para Niños y Familias tiene un equipo de Enfermeras de Salud Pública para ayudar a las familias de crianza a establecer o continuar servicios con un hogar médico. 

Research has shown that when partners are securely attached, they find it easier to be good parents. They also model healthy relationships for their children and tend to have children who are also securely attached. 

65 children remained in group homes/shelter care

31.3% of siblings are separated from each other

18.3% are placed with some, but not all siblings
